Visitor Numbers Double

The numbers of visitors to the Historic Visitor Centre during the 2005-2006 financial year (April to March) have more than doubled. Records show that 1579 people visited the Centre, although there was a considerable variation from month to month. In part, the fluctuation appears to be seasonal; the months with the smallest totals were during the winter, and numbers burgeoned during the improved weather of spring, summer and autumn. However, the difference was also probably affected from February, 2006 when we began opening on four, rather than two days a week.

Local special events which attract visitors, such as the annual Craft Day, were also influential. There has been a noticeable increase in visitor numbers on the fourth Sunday of each month since the Farmers' Markets began in February.

Sundays and public holidays remain the most popular days.

A further boost to numbers was given by some group visits (including schools) and family reunions. On several of these occasions, the Centre was opened by special arrangement.

Auckland War Memorial Museum Visit

In the last Newsletter, members were advised that the Historic Visitor Centre had become an institutional member of the Auckland Museum Institute and a visit by our members was proposed to enable us to find out about the War Memorial Museum's services and resources which may be used in the development of our own archives and displays.

AGM Guest Speaker

Dr Neville Ritchie will be the guest speaker at the Visitor Centre Annual General Meeting on 27 June. He is an archaeologist employed by the Department of Conservation in Hamilton, and the author of *The Waikato War of 1863-64: A guide to the main events and sites* which is sold in the Centre.

Neville is a member of the Waipa District Heritage Council and a member of its working party on the preservation of the site of Matakitaki Pa.

In recent years, he has spent periods at McMurdo Sound, Antarctica in a continuing involvement in the recording and preservation of historical buildings, including Shackleton Hut.

At the AGM, he will review the Waikato Land War 1863-4.

Since January

10 February: A familiarisation visit to the Centre by members of the **Waipa Senior Council** accompanied by Mayor Alan Livingston.

25 February: A visit to the Centre by members of the Rotorua and District Historical Society en route to Kawhia. They would like to come back to join us when we hold another archaeological tour.

25 February: Four members from the Kawhia Museum and five from Pirongia met with Owen Ormsby of the Auckland Museum Institute to discuss a possible combined visit to the Auckland War Memorial Museum.

3 March: A minibus load of **French tourists** arrived in a state of excitement at having seen the French flag flying outside. Of course, this was the bargain basement flag which Shirley Scott acquired to signal when we are open!

22 March: A visit by teachers and 21 pupils from **Te Pahu School** finding out about the history of their district.

25 March: Presentation to the Pirongia Community of a NZ Historic Places Trust Certificate of Merit for its 'support for and services to heritage' in relocating and preserving the former St Saviour's Church as the Historic Visitor Centre. The Certificate specifically acknowledges the activities of the Pirongia Ratepayers and Residents' Association.



Old photographs are a great source of information

Old photographs are a great source of information about local history and the Centre is keen to add to the photographs in its archives. They are most useful when they are dated and when the occasion and/or the people in them are identified. So, anyone donating photographs should include with them any details that can be provided about when, where and who is depicted. However, even if some details are unknown, someone else may be able to add to them.

Original prints are the most valuable, but modern techniques of photographic reproduction mean that originals are not essential. They are required only long enough to have a good quality reproduction made.

Only copies of photographs in our archives are used for displays. This means that any photos donated will be stored under conditions to preserve them and we will scan and print images for display.

Useful detail in an old photograph

Last August, Alan and Glenyss Hall updated our display on the Bell family, adding material and details which had come to hand since the original display was assembled. Soon afterwards, Tony Hodgson, who owned the Bell Store after it passed out of the hands of the Bell family, visited the Centre and donated an aerial photograph of the store in the 1950s, when it was owned by the Bell brothers. The ownership is confirmed by the sign. However, Tony said that when he owned the store he came across some old receipts from before World War 1 which made it appear that someone named Moon had owned the business.

Recently, Una Conon a former Pirongia resident, donated some old photos to the Centre. One is clearly the Bell store on the corner of Crozier and Franklin Streets in its early years. However, its sign reads 'Moon & Co'. Further investigation unearthed a photograph of the Pirongia Hockey Club in 1913 where one W.G. Moon was the Vice President. Leighton's 1930 Auckland Business Directory lists Walter Moon of Pirongia as 'Accountant'.

Clearly, there is more of the story to be unearthed, but it illustrates the usefulness of photographs as pieces of evidence when assembling the jigsaw of the past.

Toilet upgrade

Some pointless vandalism in March created the need for a new wooden panel in the door of the Visitor Centre toilet. At the time, it was suggested that the floor surface needed improvement to facilitate easier and more effective cleaning. Tiles were suggested and when the Te Awamutu Tile and Carpet Court was approached for a quote, the proprietors, Darren and Angela Davis, offered to supply and lay the tiles free of charge providing the Centre covers the costs of some levelling of the floor and edging around the top of the tiles. The work is proceeding and we look forward to a properly-finished facility, thanks to the generosity of the Tile and Carpet Court.
