A Great Turnout for the AGM

The Annual General Meeting of the Visitor Centre, held on 27 June, was attended by 39 members and members of the public. Clearly, the drawcard was the speaker, Dr Neville Ritchie, DoC archaeologist for the region, who presented a pictorial review of *The Waikato War 1863-64*.

Those present enjoyed the presentation of images of the most significant fortifications and battle sites in General Cameron's military campaign into the Waikato which ended at Orakau. The combination of historical and contemporary images, together with Neville's commentary, were sufficient to stir some interest in a future motor tour of some sites by the Visitor Centre, including possibly the other Alexandra Redoubt (an earlier one) near Tuakau and the Queen's Redoubt at Pokeno which is being re-constructed.

Prior to Neville Ritchie's presentation, President Sabina Owen reported on a successful year's activities noting a doubling of visitor numbers and the successful completion of a number of projects.

The financial report showed that the Centre is in a sound financial position despite its tight budget. The election of officers returned all who were willing to stand again. Foundation committee-member Steve Rasmussen stood down and was replaced by Barbara Walter. Secretary Julie Karsten also stood down, and has not been replaced at this stage. The Executive Committee has the power to co-opt when a suitable volunteer is forthcoming.

Since May

Since May, we have experienced the same seasonal downturn in visitor numbers experienced in earlier years.

However, a surprise was that although the July numbers were low compared with the summer months, they were significantly up on 2005. The difference seemed to occur particularly during a period of clear, sunny days which also coincided with the final few days of the school holidays.

An honour for Mary Hurst

At the AGM, a change to the constitution made it possible for the Centre to award an Honorary Life Membership for outstanding service. At the same meeting, it was resolved that the first Honorary Life Membership should be awarded to Mary Hurst who has made significant contributions by researching and recording local history, and also played an important role in helping to secure the site when the old St Saviour's Church building was relocated from Waikeria to Pirongia in 2000. Mary has continued to make valued contributions to the work of the Centre.

The presentation of the Honorary Life Membership to Mary will occur at the first of our Special Events to be held in the Centre on 12 September. On that occasion, Alan Hall will speak about W.G.Mair, who was a significant figure in Alexandra in the 1870s and who returned here in July 1881 as the government official to whom King Tawhiao and more than 500 followers from the Māori King Movement chose to lay down their arms to signal the end of hostilities following the Waikato Land War in 1863-64.

Mair is a figure in whom Mary is greatly interested. She triggered Alan's interest, and although the research is far from complete, sufficient has been unearthed to be of general interest and worth sharing on this important occasion for the Historic Visitor Centre. All members and members of the public will be welcome.

Some Benefits of Membership

One initiative by the new committee has been to develop a modest annual calendar of events for members and in some cases, members of the public. The draft plan for the forthcoming year, which has been accepted in principle at this stage, includes two meetings involving speakers, an archaeological tour of local historical sites, a panel on investigating family histories, and a motor tour of some of the sites talked about by Neville Ritchie at the AGM.

It is proposed to hold events at roughly two-monthly intervals and to make at least some of them available to members of the wider public.

The schedule is not onerous and has the potential to be sustainable in future years. If you have ideas for future events, pass them on to someone on the committee. If this works as we hope it will, we will be looking for new ideas about this time next year.

Those Old Photos

We are keen to get copies of old photographs of past life in Pirongia. The following are of particular interest:

- The Buffalo Lodge building which stood where the present Persimmon Tree Café is located. It was still standing in 2000.
- The original teacher's house in Kane Street which was there until 1967.
- The old gaol building near the cemetery, which was still standing in the 1940s.
- The Post Office on the corner of Franklin and Crozier Streets.

Useful photographs may not be just of the building in question. Even if the building is in the background the picture can provide useful information.

Remember that we can have such pictures copied so that it is not necessary to donate them, although the donation of originals is always welcome.

Borer Eradication

Most people associated with the Centre know that we have tried to manage a problem with borer in the building with limited success. Recently, the Centre received a grant of \$3,300 from the New Zealand Community Trust for borer eradication.

Smith's Pest Control Services were awarded a contract which involved injecting chemicals into borer holes, spraying the wall cavities through holes drilled in the weatherboard and treating the floor from beneath.

At the moment, the building is infused with the smell of kerosene, the solvent used. But that inconvenience, which will dissipate quite quickly, is a small price to pay to be rid of a pest with potential to destroy the building.

Don't forget to visit the Centre on Craft Day (September 23rd)

This year, the Craft Day organizer has arranged to leave two clear stall sites in front of the Centre so that visitors (and members) can find the place. Last year, we were rather cut off.

This year, as a special event, Ben van der Sande and a fellow blacksmith will be operating a forge outside the building and inside, traditional weaver Garry Grace will again demonstrate cloak weaving. This demonstration was highly praised by visitors last year, and we know that many who missed out then are keen to see this important traditional craft.
